For the last twenty-five years the UCLA Emeriti Association and the UCLA Emeriti Center co-host a fine arts and craft exhibition which has firmly established itself as the highlight of the UCLA Emeriti Association's spring season. This event features several dozen exhibitors whose works include painting, sculpture, woodcraft, jewelry, photography, egg and textile artistry, poetry, etc. It has become a tradition to single out a distinguished exhibitor for special recognition. The event, held in a large banquet room at UCLA's Faculty Center is capped by an elegant reception.

More modest efforts are seen in a permanent space for revolving art exhibits recently established at Emory University. A one-day exhibit of artwork and post-retirement publications was featured at a gala event for retirees/Emeriti at the University of Southern California.

#### Message from the President

Welcome to our first newsletter. This summer at our board meeting in Asilomar near Monterey, California, I

took on the role of president. I want to thank Paul Hadley of USC for his foundational work as AROHE's first president. It was largely Paul's ideas and careful efforts over a number of years that gave birth to AROHE. I was impressed from my first personal contact with him in San Diego three years ago. He will remain as an honorary lifetime member of the board, and we will continue to benefit from his insights.

Asilomar launched us into important next steps for the development of AROHE. Tom Elleman of North Carolina State took the helm of the membership committee; Tom will be leading us toward potential new members. Bill Dando of Indiana State is working on plans to help us find funding from various sources. And Barry Culhane of Rochester Institute of Technology is fashioning a brochure for AROHE's general publicity; Barry is also working with Shelley Glazer of UC Berkeley to revise our web site with the aid of a professional web site company. Betty Redmon of our central office at USC is overseeing the production of this newsletter in hard copy and in a computer version. The web site improvements, the new brochure and the newsletter will greatly improve our communication with members and others.

Shelley, our program chair for the 2004 conference in Nashville, and I visited that city in October to check out conference hotels and develop links with major institutions like Vanderbilt and Tennessee State.

These are only a few of the activities that indicate the energy of AROHE. I think our organization is on the cusp of an important coming movement in higher education. The large "baby boomer" cohort, as it retires from the academy in ever greater numbers during the next decade and beyond, will be looking for creative ways for continuity with their careers and communities in higher education. With longer life spans, these retirees will have decades more of creativity after formally leaving their posts. AROHE's task is to ask how all this talent can be used for school and community, as well as for the personal satisfaction of emeriti/ae.

As I look at programs for retirees at a number of

schools, I see a lively diversity of positive outcomes. Emeriti/ae continue to teach part-time, lecture on campus and off, meet with students on various projects, have discussion breakfasts and lunches, continue research and writing, construct film series and galleries for faculty art, organize tours at home and abroad, mentor younger faculty, hold receptions for a variety of purposes, offer retirement seminars among other programs. Those who involve themselves in these groups meet new friends who they may not have known during their active years on the faculty.

Administrators are coming to understand that such organizations on campus help maintain a healthy spirit among faculty and staff who conclude that officials care about the wider span of their lives. This in turn stimulates an environment for giving back to the school both in services and in financial donations. For example, the very existence of an Emeritus College at Emory, my school, has directly and indirectly generated two sizeable gifts. University officials are increasingly coming to realize the truth of a motto at the University of California, Berkeley: Cal is a family; you don't retire from a family. In light of this, there is something excessively individualistic in older retirement procedures. After decades of collegial life, the retiree is turned out with few or no continuing options to stay involved with one's previous academic community. AROHE testifies that there are better ways to deal with retirement in higher education.

How does AROHE do this? We provide a national and international forum for building vital retirement organizations, maximizing contributions of faculty and staff to one another and to wider communities. We disseminate information on best practices of retirement groups in various schools, and we provide ideas on ways to start such organizations. We thus operate as a clearinghouse for exchanging ideas on emeriti groups. A thumbnail summary of our mission statement was devised at Asilomar: to advocate, to educate, to serve, to connect....all retirement organizations in higher education.
